4. **Les molaires** : situées à l'arrière de la bouche, elles ont une surface large et plates, idéales pour mastiquer. La dernière rangée de molaires, appelées dents de sagesse, peut parfois ne pas apparaître ou être extraite.

Le processus de développement

Le développement des dents, appelé odontogenèse, commence très tôt dans la vie embryonnaire. Chez l'humain, la formation des dents permanentes débute vers l'âge de 6 ans, avec la chute progressive des dents de lait. La croissance et l'éruption des dents suivent un ordre précis, permettant une dentition fonctionnelle et équilibrée.
